Greater Washington Partnership Launches Inaugural Cohort for Diverse Entrepreneur Accelerator Program

Next Level: Elevating Diverse Entrepreneurs aims to accelerate growth and investment in Black, Brown, and women-owned businesses from Baltimore to Richmond

WASHINGTON – Today, the Greater Washington Partnership, a nonprofit alliance of the region's most influential and leading employers, announced the launch of *Next Level: Elevating Diverse Entrepreneurs*, a new business accelerator pilot program funded by a grant from Truist Foundation. The program, in collaboration with local nonprofit accelerator 1863 Ventures, will provide customized technical assistance, coaching, and curated events to help Black, Brown, and women-owned businesses from Baltimore to Richmond acquire, fulfill, and retain contracts for the region's largest buyers.

"Diverse businesses are a key driver of economic growth," said Kathy Hollinger, CEO of Greater Washington Partnership. "Yet, the Partnership's Inclusive Growth Dashboard shows acute racial disparities in business ownership and survival. While Black residents make up nearly 27% of the region's population, the number of Black small business owners is only 5%. By providing more opportunities for Black, Brown, and women entrepreneurs to connect and network with large-scale companies, this new collaboration with Truist Foundation and 1863 Ventures will help diverse businesses gain equitable opportunity to acquire contracts and sustain their businesses."

According to the Fed Small Business Credit Survey, the pandemic further exacerbated racial disparities in business ownership and success - 86% of Black-owned and 85% of Latino-owned small businesses reported sales declines in 2020, compared to 79% of White-owned businesses. The Partnership's new Entrepreneurship Insights Brief, developed in partnership with Deloitte, also showed that challenges for business success and growth are complex. Diverse-entrepreneurs face unique barriers to accessing capital, talent, markets, and networks, and collective support in each of these four areas is critical to closing longstanding equity gaps.



The *Next Level* program builds on the Partnership's larger efforts to support diverse-owned businesses by helping to connect corporations with suppliers who are historically overlooked and underutilized through networking, market exposure, and technical assistance.

Last year, Partnership organizations made a collective \$4.7 billion, 5-year commitment to support Brown, Black and women-owned businesses and underrepresented communities through direct investment across supplier diversity, community development financial institutions (CDFIs)/minority depository institutions (MDIs) support, and racial equity programs from Baltimore to Richmond. The *Next Level* program also complements the Partnership's regionwide supplier diversity community of practice, which leverages toolkits, relationships, and convenings to help more than 100 corporate leaders increase spending with diverse businesses.

"At Truist, we're committed to creating pathways for small business owners, particularly women entrepreneurs and entrepreneurs of color, to help them succeed and access wealth-building opportunities," said Evelyn Lee, Truist regional president for Greater Washington. "Supporting the Greater Washington Partnership's great work in this area is an example of how we live our purpose to inspire and build better lives and communities."

"1863 Ventures is thrilled to strengthen the business accelerator ecosystem in our region, with the introduction of Next Level. The collaboration between 1863, Greater Washington Partnership and Truist Foundation will equip diverse entrepreneurs with the necessary tools to acquire and retain contracts for the region's largest and most competitive buyers. We look forward to welcoming the inaugural cohort of entrepreneurs who will spend the next several months learning and applying concepts to accelerate their business growth, access capital and grow their networks," said Melissa Bradley, Founder and Managing Partner of 1863 Ventures.

Sixteen business owners from across the region were selected for this inaugural cohort and will receive curated training, coaching, and tools to present their value proposition to navigate procurement processes and raise capital. Businesses will also gain access to a regional network of fellow large-scale companies as well as Greater Washington Partnership organizations. Upon completion of the program, participants will leverage the skills and relationships they've obtained to pitch their services to companies and investors from across the region.
